MARCH ON WASHINGTON CELEBRATION

50th Anniversary Celebration

Fifty years ago, on August 28, 1963, one of many American protests led by Dr. Martin Luther King, became the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. Many Americans girded for turmoil, bedlam and chaos. Many predicted that it would be "impossible" for Negroes to petition in large numbers without civil disorder. The Kennedy Administration deployed over 4,000 riot troops near downtown Washington, with 15,000 paratroopers on alert, liquor sales were banned for the first time since prohibition, local hospitals canceled elective surgery to save beds, and two major league baseball games were postponed. Thousands of people, of all ages, arrived in Washington via buses, cars, trains and planes, singing Negro spirituals and gospel hymns. It is estimated that a quarter of a million people, many who were white, marched peacefully from the Washington Monument to the Lincoln Memorial.

That event is now remembered as one of the most important symbols of the civil rights movement of the 1950s and 1960s. In the early 1960s, segregation, or the separation of people by race, was accepted in many parts of the U.S., particularly the South. Black people and white people could not attend the same schools, sit next to each other on buses, or even use the same water fountains. Businesses often refused to hire people based solely on the color of their skin.

The purpose of this march was to focus attention on President Kennedy's Civil Rights Bill which would ban racial discrimination in public facilities, increase protection for African American voting rights, provide protection for demonstrators against police brutality, a public-works program to provide jobs, an increase in the minimum wage, and strengthen the federal government's ability to enforce desegregation of public schools.

RTH celebrated this momentous occasion with Music on the Plaza which featured comments from Dr. Mel King and Tom Cornu, who participated in the 1863 march, performances by our resident poet and songstress, Barbara Clerke, and the Phoenix Towards the Sun Singing and Dancing Group. The celebration ended with a hand-clapping, foot stomping, inspiring concert of gospel music performed by the Boston Community Choir.

Mission Hill artist Marilyn Jan Casey is a modern spiritual expressionist. Marilyn has been a resident of RTH for 13 years. She

worked for a year in the RTH After School Program doing art projects. "I decided that I needed more education to help the children in my community."

Marilyn is a member of the Mission Hill Artists Collective (MHAC) which focuses on providing opportunities for artists to display their work in the community.

Although she suffered a spinal cord injury, it didn't stop Casey from earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at Massachusetts College of Art and Design in 2008 and earning 14 honors from the school. While there she also won the George Nick Award and the Black Hall Achievement Award from Bridgewater College. Some of her art her has been displayed in multiple solo exhibitions in Boston and with other artists.

"I valued life more after my injury because I could've been gone," Casey said. "I was grateful to God for saving my life so I decided to share the gift God gave me." Casey's art "Modern Spiritual Expressions" is currently being exhibited at Sparr's (at the corner of Huntington and Longwood Avenues). Just recently her art was on display at the Parker Hill Branch Library in Mission Hill, where a large crowd of her friends and neighbors gathered last month for her artist's reception. Casey describes her work as "filled with love," and said she hopes

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YOUTH BUILDING COMMUNITY

The Youth Building Communities program run by the Roxbury Tenants of Harvard's Youth Department enrolled 15 youth for a summer experience of job readiness, financial literacy, entrepreneurship, community development, volunteering, and fun field trips. The program is designed for youth who have out grown summer camp and are too young to work a summer job. The youth were provided a combination of learning opportunities in job readiness skills and community development through a volunteer experience at the Jewish Memorial Rehabilitation Center with a weekly stipend of twenty dollars. The youth also completed two Junior Achievement curriculums in Financial Literacy and Entrepreneurship and six Artful Adventure workshops at the Museum of Fine Arts to learn how art and design fit into to the world of work. Lastly, the youth were taken on several fun filled field trips to Laser Quest to play laser tag, the IMAX theatre to see GO Bots, Metro Rock for rock climbing, the Kroc Center to splash around their indoor aquatics center, and Fire & Ice for a tasty lunch. All our youth had a blast on the field trips, and the learning opportunities have prepared them to seek summer jobs in the future.

YOUTH COUNCIL

The Roxbury Tenants of Harvard's youth council completed three initiatives this past spring and summer. The recycling initiative, which began in 2012, finally came to completion this past July with the help of the facilities department. The youth council members for the past year promoted recycling to the residents in the townhouses, and recorded the names of those interested in receiving a big blue bin. The facilities department agreed to purchase the bins and stencil street addresses on the bins for residents. When the bins arrived youth council members delivered them to the townhouses for a total of 100.

The youth council collaborated with the senior department for an intergenerational game night on June 27th. The game night was well attended and the intent was to bring youth and senior residents together to socialize playing board games.

The final initiative the youth council participated in was the Climb America Challenge. Nine youth members committed themselves to train for the Climb America Challenge by climbing the stairs in the Levenson building once a week. All in preparation for the Brigham and Women's Climbathon held on June 29th at 100 Summer Street in downtown Boston.

NDEPENDENT SCHOOL ENTRANCE EXAM (ISEE

The Independent School Entrance Exam (ISEE), the most advanced admission test available for independent schools, is used throughout the U.S., internationally, and for the City of Boston's Exam Schools. Thousands of students seek entry to Boston's three exam schools each year - only approximately four hundred will be invited to attend in any given year. The RTH ISEE Test Prep Class has prepared 22 students so far, 13 have been accepted to Boston's exam schools!
